INTERACT launches study in Saskatoon

This summer (June-July), the Saskatoon INTERACT team designed and conducted a small pilot study to examine the impact of route changes on transit use, wait times, rider satisfaction, and more.

Though the sample size was small (N=35) the study helped the team to refine data collection tools, participant recruitment methods, and gave the research team a small look into the impact of service changes on riders.

This September, the baseline for the main 5-year cohort study is

being conducted. The team aims to recruit 500 participants into the cohort. Residents of the city are eligible if they fall into one of two groups: (1) are a current regular bus rider; and/or (2) live within an 800m buffer of the proposed Bus Rapid Transit lines.
